Greetings friends!

Recent conversations and personal readings of devotions have intersected or collided for me. I love when that happens! It's like the Spirit is saying: "Hey! How about this?" Or "Here is something new to think about in a new way." And then He provides the opportunity to share it. Well, here is one of the latest of such lessons.



I've always noticed how Christians tend to jump into the "armory" and get all excited about getting "suited up" in order to fight the devil. I imagine a little kid dressing up in baggy uniform, helmet, and lugging unwieldy weapons, playing soldier. The Christians in this situation mostly do this in a defensive posture or mode to stand up against the attacks which in and of itself is not a bad thing, but it is not complete.

As disciples and followers of Jesus we also need to be on the offensive. And what is needed for having both in place is a strategy for warfare. Il Corinthians 10:3 "Though we live in the world, we do not wage war as the world does." Satan most certainly has strategies in place against us and is constantly attacking. However, so do we have a strategy and it is not of this world! It is superior, supernatural, and Spirit inspired!

It is important for us to know this and understand this otherwise we are like children playing soldiers in our costumes. We need to believe this so that we can effectively employ what's in the armory against the enemy! As little children we really don't know the functions and power that we possess. Il Corinthians 10:4 "The weapons we fight with are not the weapons of the world. On the contrary, they divine power to demolish strongholds."

By going through the basic training of searching and reading God's Word and spending time in prayer under the leading of the Holy Spirit as our Drill Sargent, the strategies for defense and offense will reaffirm the victory of Christ on the Cross!

SOME INFORMATION FOR YOU ABOUT HOLY WEEK...





Dress warmly, bring flashlights, a blanket to sit on, and a box of donuts to share with others and the hope of Easter!









CHILDREN'S EASTER EGG HUNT

The Easter Egg Hunt will be held right after Sunday School at 11:00 am. Children up to 4th Grade are invited to attend. All children will gather together in Fellowship Hall at the end of Sunday School. Donations of small wrapped candies are being requested and will be collected the week before to fill the plastic eggs.

THE EASTER EGG

Jeremy was born with a twisted body and a slow mind. At the age of 12 he was still in second grade, seemingly unable to learn. His teacher, Doris Miller, often became exasperated with him.

Spring came, and the children talked excitedly about the coming of Easter. Doris told them the story of Jesus, and then to emphasize the idea of new life springing forth, she gave each of the children a large plastic egg.

"Now," she said to them, "I want you to take this home and bring it back tomorrow with something inside that shows new life. Do you understand?"

"Yes, Miss Miller," the children responded enthusiastically --all except for Jeremy. He listened intently; his eyes never left her face. Had he understood what she had said about Jesus' death and resurrection? Did he understand the assignment?

Perhaps she should call his parents and explain the project to them.

The next morning, 19 children came to school, laughing and talking as they placed their eggs in the large wicker basket on Miss Miller's desk. After they completed their math lesson, it was time to open the eggs.

In the first egg, Doris found a flower. "Oh yes, a flower is certainly a sign of new life," she said. "When plants peek through the ground, we know that spring is here."

The next egg contained a plastic butterfly, which looked very real. Doris held it up. "We all know that a caterpillar changes and grows into a beautiful butterfly. Yes, that's new life, too."

Next, Doris found a rock with moss on it. She explained that moss, too, showed life.

Then Doris opened the fourth egg. She gasped. The egg was empty. Surely it must be Jeremy's she thought, and of course, he did not understand her instructions. If only she had not forgotten to phone his parents. Because she did not want to embarrass him, she quietly set the egg aside and reached for another. Suddenly, Jeremy spoke up. "Miss Miller, aren't you going to talk about my egg?" Flustered, Doris replied, "But Jeremy, your egg is empty."

He looked into her eyes and said softly, "Yes, but Jesus' tomb was empty, too."

Time stopped. When she could speak again, Doris asked him, "Do you know why the tomb was empty?"

"Oh, yes," Jeremy said, "Jesus was killed and put in there.
Then His Father raised Him up."

Three months later, Jeremy died. Those who paid their respects at the mortuary were surprised to see 19 eggs on top of his casket, all of them empty.

easy resources: for adults (18 and over), there are 2 forms: The PA criminal background check (ACT 34) and the Child Abuse Clearance Form (ACT 151).

Volunteers (adults 18 and over) can: 1. Fill out the paper forms and return them to Debbie Letham, Amy Hansen or SPR representatives for processing (the church

will pay for them). OR 2. Fill out the forms yourself online or by mail and return the copies to us. We need to see the originals and to make a copy for the file. Fees can be reimbursed or applied towards your regular LUMC donation.

The PA criminal background check can be done online and paid for with a credit card online. The Child Abuse form can be filled out online, but needs to be printed out and mailed in with a \$10 money order. Links to the online sites:

YOUR CHURCH FINANCES

General Fund - February

February total income was \$1,459 over budget. The receipts from offering envelopes were \$198 over budget. The income from other receipts was \$1,231 over budget plus an extra \$115 from the endowment income contributed to the total income. February expenses were -\$767 under the budgeted amount. The result of all this is a Net Ordinary Income of \$127 for February which is \$2,226 over the budgeted estimate. The operating cash balance for February was \$15,370.

General Fund – Year-to-Date

The year-to-date total income was -\$6,026 under budget. The receipts from offering envelopes were down -\$6,324. The income from other receipts helped to offset the loss from offerings a bit.

The year-to-date expenses were -\$674 under budget. The result of all this is a Net Ordinary Income of -\$10,353 for the year which is -\$5,353 under the budgeted short fall. This is due primarily to the -\$7,749 short fall in offering envelope giving in January.

Raise the Roof Update



The monthly dedicated donations were \$2,032 which was -\$1,061 less than needed for the \$3.093 monthly payment. The reserve fund balance is \$17,411. Note that the total of in memoriam donations through February is \$4,959.

Steve & Gail Quigg: We spent a week in Coshocton auditing MMS Aviation. MMS's purpose is "to prepare people and planes for worldwide mission service" and they've been doing that incredibly well for decades. We led a relatively inexperienced auditing team through the process, but what they lacked in auditing experience, they more than made up with aviation knowledge, industrial safety expertise, and enough energy to handle the 6" of snow and single digit temperatures with ease. As she typically does in these situations, Gail worked harder than all the rest of us by interviewing the spouses and providing encouragement and insight all along the way.

A great number of you participated in the Giving Tuesday celebration at the beginning of the holiday season and the response was overwhelming in every aspect. T.H.A.N.K. Y.O.U. for all you did! When the conversation about offering a matching gift of \$500,000 first began, our mission leaders thought it was a stretch. The single biggest day of giving prior to Giving Tuesday was \$492,000 after the Haiti earthquake. They felt that with \$500,000, Global Ministries was giving a generous lead gift. Imagine everyone's surprise when the matching funds were depleted in just over 2 minutes! More than \$2 million was given in the first hour and the total reached \$6.5 million by the time midnight arrived. Even though our aviation accounts didn't get nearly as much of the matching gifts as we had hoped for, like everyone else, we were overwhelmed by the generosity of giving to our account in particular, and to the work of Global Ministries in general. We are excited to see all that will be accomplished for Christ through the generosity of your giving.
